Extract from the deportation list of transport 11, which left Vienna's Aspang Train Station for Kaunas in Lithuania on 23rd November 1941. The deportation was made up of 1000 Jewish men, women and children who were then shot on arrival. There are no known survivors.

The SS-Standartenführer Karl Jäger noted in his “Statement on the Executions carried out by the Einsatzkommando 3 up until 1st December 1941: “29.11.41, Kaunas F. IX, 693 Jewish men, 1155 Jewish women, 152 Jewish children (resettled from Vienna and Wrocław).”

The National Socialists murdered more than 66,000 Austrian Jews. The Documentation Centre of Austrian Resistance (DÖW) has identified 63,863 of them and their names, date of birth, last known address in Austria and information about their deportation is available via the DÖW’s online database (doew.at). If the date of death is also known it is included, however in most cases it has not possible.

The Jewish Community was forced by the Nazis to compile the lists of names for transports, first sending people into the unknown and later to their certain death. The largest transport lists had on average 1000 names and remain a stark and powerful artefact of mass murder.

The DÖW has combined the data of 46,000 Austrian Holocaust victims with the corresponding transport list and incorporated this into the online database with the support of the company Braintrust. All the surviving transport lists have been scanned and added the website. The names on the transport lists of those who were deported and murdered are now linked to the information available about their subsequent fate. This makes the individuals behind the almost unending lists of the dead more concrete and visible.
